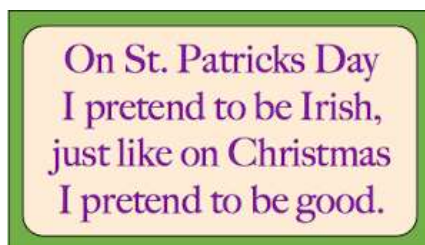
	Bursary Report

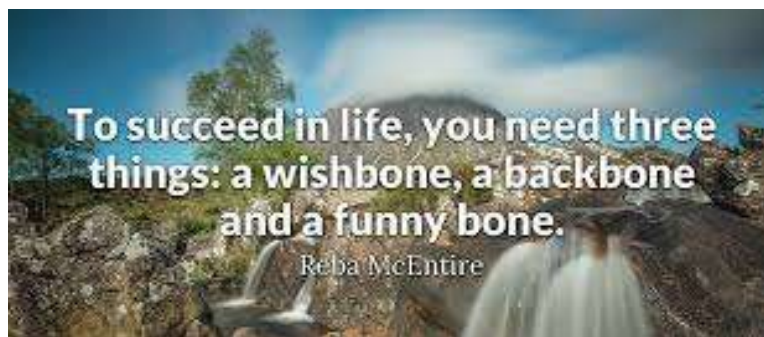
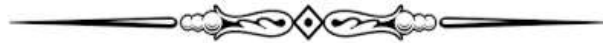

Poppy is a year around endeavour to help our Veterans at home and abroad in their time of need. At our meeting held on Tuesday, February 23rd, I am pleased to announce that 8 different donations from the Poppy Trust Fund totaling \$22,000.00 were approved to help our Veterans!

The approved donations are as follows:

1. \$5000 to the Owen Sound Hospital Foundation for surgical equipment for procedures such as knee and hip replacements; subject to the approval of ON Command;
2. \$5000 to the Saugeen Memorial Hospital Foundation for surgical equipment for procedures such as knee and hip replacements; subject to the approval of ON Command;
3. \$3000 to the RCL ON Command – Operation Service Dog; subject to the approval of ON Command;
4. \$2000 to the RCL ON Command – Charitable Foundation;
5. \$1500 to the RCL ON Command – Bursary;
6. \$2500 to the RCL ON Command – Leave the Streets Behind;
7. \$1000 to Dominion Command – RCEL;
8. \$2000 to the District C Hospital Fund;



If any member is aware of any veteran, whether a Legion member or not, who may need assistance, please do not hesitate to contact me or Mike Hobson, our Branch Service Officer who can contact the veteran directly to assess any support that may be required.

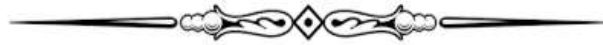

Commanders' Corner

Joint e-Training for Branch and LA Members
February 20 2021



As a follow up to the refresher training article on the special relationship that exists between Branch and LA Members last month, this article will look at the ways that the Branch and the Ladies Auxiliary interact, especially focusing on the overseeing responsibilities of the Branch General Membership. Each has its own Charter, however since the full title of the LA is The Ladies Auxiliary To The Branch, then should the Branch Charter ever be relinquished or rescinded then the Ladies Auxiliary Charter will have to automatically be ceded also since the LA is under the jurisdiction of the legal entity the Branch itself and therefore subject to certain limitations.

While the members of the two organizations work alongside each other in harmony and respect to support the Branch, the Branch General Membership has specific responsibilities

according to The General By-Laws of the Ontario Provincial Command. The Branch approves both the LA Charter and By-Laws and any expenditure over \$500. It receives a copy of the LA Audited Financial Statements yearly and can appoint auditors and also can request copies of any minutes of the Ladies Auxiliary meetings, though in practice this rarely needs to happen as the LA Liaison provides communication.

Conversely the Ladies Auxiliary has no jurisdiction over the Branch so it is unable to restrict Branch members in their operations. For example, even though the LA main business area is the kitchen, they are not able to pass a motion to exclude Branch members from using it as it belongs to the Branch. Usually, though, it is the Ladies Auxiliary members who do the majority of the catering providing their delicious meals for most all occasions. Always a delight to have. The Presidents oversee their respective areas and keep each other informed. Should a disagreement arise it is their job to settle it amicably. If a disagreement is unable to be settled this way then the Branch President appoints a committee of three Branch members, appointing one a chairperson, and asks the Ladies Auxiliary President to appoint two further LA members. The committee investigates the disagreement and reports its findings, conclusions and recommendations to the Branch Executive which then reports to the Branch General Membership for approval.

A more formal process to settle individual complaints is Article III, a legal procedure that is administered by the Branch President on behalf of either the Branch or Ladies Auxiliary on receipt of a written complaint along with a \$100 fee. It has to be lodged correctly with the Branch Secretary according to the procedure laid out in The General By-Laws of The Royal Canadian Legion. A complaint can only be lodged by and against members of their own organization, although it is possible for someone to be a member of both. In that instance any resolution will apply to both the Branch and LA.

With the lockdown over at the time of writing this we can all look forward to resuming normal operations, albeit under certain restrictions still, and the continuance of the close working relationship that exists between the Branch and the Ladies Auxiliary members including the holding of a joint meeting. It is an excellent time to show and verbalize to each other some appreciation for all the hard work and dedication that goes on year after year by both members.

Thank you everyone for your continuing efforts and good luck in the coming weeks. Stay safe and well.

Our Branches could not exist and accomplish the important work they do without your tireless and selfless devotion of the Branch and Ladies Auxiliary members working together.

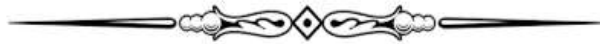

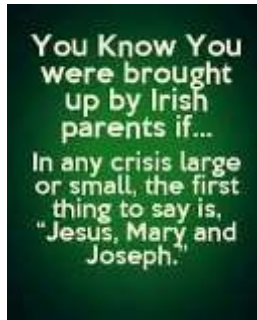

Conway Twitty.....Is that Really You.....

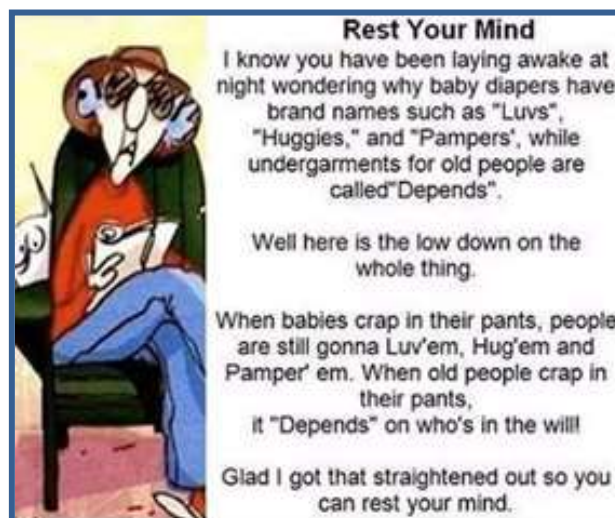
