Bursary Program




Now is the best time to apply for a bursary. Students have to verify that they are in second semester before they mail their application to Ontario Command.

After another successful 2021 Poppy Campaign and again dealing with the challenges of the COVID-19 Pandemic, Vicky and I wish you and your families **A Happy Holiday Season**, the **Best for the New Year, 2022!**

This year introduced the **TIPTAP PAY** Poppy Box which we located at Walmart that allowed donors to use their debit or credit cards to donate to our Poppy Fund. The **TIPTAPPAY** Box alone raised over \$2,700.00 after a 5% processing/administrative fee. National Poppy Command in Ottawa advised us that RCL Branch 340, Port Elgin was the 4th highest **TIPTAPPAY** BOX fund raiser in Canada out of the 700 branches using a single **TIPTAPPAY** Box this year. Of the 3 Branches ahead of us 2 were in Ottawa and the 3rd in Oshawa.

Our Veterans' needs are a year around endeavour. Last year our Poppy Fund donated over \$20,000 to help meet Veterans and their family's needs. With this year's Poppy Campaign success even more funds will be available to be used to address their most urgent needs.



AIR CADETS
340 (Griffin) Squadron, Port Elgin



With the New Year of 2022 now upon us, the #340 Griffin Air Cadet Squadron would like to acknowledge and extend greetings to our many Legion Branches, Executive, Members and Legion friends that have supported us in the past and continue to do so in the future.

The past years have been unlike any other in recent memory as our world took a dramatic change with a global pandemic. As Liaison to the Air Cadet Squadron and on behalf of Captain Robert Herborth, Sponsoring Committee and Officers, there are simply not enough expressions of thanks for the continued Legion financial support to the Air Cadet program.

Despite many obstacles to overcome and the continual transitions back into online Cadet virtual learning, somehow the Squadron conquered many tasks over the last year. Meetings and online learning is not always ideal, yet through all of this the Cadets are persevering and continuing to learn and grow. For Immediate Release:

The Department of National Defense issued orders today to COL S. Clause, recalling him to active duty, with a report date of 24 Dec 2021.

A reservist with 1,742 years of service, the airborne Soldier specializes in vertical delivery of high-value items. He is airborne and air assault qualified. He is also a Public Affairs Specialist.

Prisoners of War Rules versus Actions



"If you have ever wondered about "Prisoners of War" and how they were treated in WWI and WWII and how they should have been treated here is a brief synopsis that is somewhat enlightening. It also touches on the German POW's that were held in Canada and there is a bit of a surprise ending to that part of the story."

1899 Hague Convention

- 22 Countries met and agreed on "Laws and Customs of War on Land".
- Agreed that each belligerent country would establish a bureau.
- They would keep information on each prisoner that they captured.
- POW's would be fed, quartered and clothed the same as the troops that had captured them.

WWI

- In 1863 the Geneva Based Red Cross had been founded.
- Their mission was to "Assist victims of war".
- One of their goals was to establish contact between POW's and their families.
- In WWI they strived to do that.

1929

- The Geneva Convention was held.
- They met to prepare supplements to the Hague Convention.
- By the start of WWII 41 countries had ratified the Geneva Convention.
- For POW's those countries agreed to "Provide Religious needs, Intellectual diversions and sports and recreational facilities.

WWII

- Germany operated approximately 1,000 POW camps.
- The Soviets never did sign the Geneva Convention.
- It is estimated that more than 5 million Soviets were interned in German Camps and more than 3 million Germans were interned in Soviet camps.
- The number of POW's that died in these camps are estimated to have been in the hundreds of thousands

WWII Canada

- About 9,000 Canadians were interned by Germany.
- Generally, they were treated close to the requirements of the Geneva Convention. Food being one area that was questioned extensively.
- Canadians that died in the German camps were mostly executions for escape or assault of German soldiers.
- Right after the D Day invasion in June 1944 there were 156 Canadian POW's executed a short distance inland from Juno Beach.



- Near the war's end, food was very scarce in Germany, and this made things even worse for the Canadian POW's.

WWII Red Cross Canada

- The Canadian Red Cross had more than 1 million volunteers. These volunteers parceled 16.5 million POW parcels that went to those interned in camps on both sides of the war. Food and personal hygiene products were included. NO CIGARETTES. These came from many other sources.
- British and American Red Cross parcels did include cigarettes.
- Germany and Russia withheld parcels from each other's POW's.
- After the war Canadian 2/3rds of our POW's said that they would not have survived as well as they did without RED CROSS parcels.
- One third of them said that even with the parcels there was not enough food.

WWII Japan

- Japan had signed but disregarded the Geneva Convention.
- They sidelined their National Red Cross from involvement.
- They barred all Red Cross ships from their waters.
- Of 32,418 Americans in Japanese POW camps there were 3,400 that died.
- At war's end there were 32,000 British Commonwealth POW's in Japanese Camps. There had been approximately 3,500 that had died before the war ended.

WWII German POW Camps in Canada

- There were 25 POW camps in Canada for Axis soldiers. They were mostly German and Italian.
- A total of 34,000 were interned here.
- Of these 137 died while being held in Canada.
- In 1971 the remains of them all were moved to the German War Graves Section of the Woodland Cemetery in Kitchener Ontario.
- There are two bodies in each grave.
